

Ammonium Nitrate- and Urea-Based Fertilizers

These products, the same used to make your fields green, can also be used as bomb-making materials. The U.S. Government is asking facility owners and operators that use these products to implement security best practices and to report suspicious activity.

Security Best Practices

- Prevent unauthorized persons from accessing storage locations
- Require access by visitors, service subcontractors, and third-party transporters to be approved by management
- Develop, maintain, regularly check, and update an inventory of fertilizer on-hand
- Limit quantities on-hand to a minimum
- V
- Encourage regular inspections in storage areas
- Train employees to recognize signs of tampering and other suspicious activity
- Report to management and local law enforcement:
 - Evidence of tampering
 - Theft or unexplained loss
 - Other suspicious activity

Be aware. Your efforts make a difference.
